

	lives <u>unknown</u> by European <u>explorers</u> .
2.	Vikings were the first Europeans to travel to North
	America, 500 years before <u>Christopher Columbus</u>
3.	Trimary Sources prove Vikings were in North America
	around 500 years before Christopher Columbus
4.	Vikings came from what is now <u>Sweden</u> , <u>Finland</u> ,
_	and Norway.
5.	They founded the countries of <u>Iceland</u> , Denmark,
	Norway, Finland, and Greenland.
,	Collectively, these countries are called <u>Scandanavia</u> .
6.	In 1000 A.D. Viking brothers named <u>Leif Erikkson</u>
	and Thorvald Erikkson sailed to what is today the
7	country of <u>Canada</u> .
/. 0	Leif Erikkson landed in what is today Newfoundland They named it Vinland which means
O. 1	"I and of many Vines" in Norse.
	Leif and Thorvald Enksson led many <u>Expeditions</u> to
	Vinland, and made a <u>Settlement</u> there.
10	. Indians in the area
_	repeatedly attacked the Viking Settlement in Vinland.
	. In one attack, Leif's brother, <u>Thorvald</u> , was
	<u>Killed</u> by Indians.
12	. After Thorvald was killed, the Vikings <u>left</u> Vinland
	and never <u>returned</u> .
13	Descendants of the Vikings Wrote of Vinland in the
	Greenlander's Saga but there was no proof
	of the settlement until <b>1464 C.E.</b> , when archaeologists found
	<u>L'Anse Aux Meadows</u> . (Jelly Fish Cove)

	have been the Africans, Irish, Asians / Russians or

Lesson 2: Marco Polo and Why the Europeans Needed India

1.	Explorer and trader <u>Marco Polo</u> was one of the first
	Europeans to travel to what is today <u>Chino</u> , bringing
	back spices, perfumes /oils and
	<u>ivory / jewels</u> and other things Europeans had never
	seen before.
2.	He traveled to India along what was called the Silk Koad
3.	Marco Polo's journey opened up <b>India</b> , which was
	what <b>Europeans</b> then called all of <b>Asia</b> , to
	trade.
4.	Traders often traveled for as long as two <u><b>yearS</b></u> ONE
	WAY to <u>India</u> , and were able to become very
	<u>rich</u> if they lived to make it back to <u>Europe</u> .
5.	When Europeans began to see the <u>Wealth</u> and
V	ralue of the items found only in, they could,
	not get enough of them. The law of Supply and demand
	took over. Much of the European <u>Culture</u> began to
	revolve around the <b>trade</b> with India.
6.	In some places, items like <u>Sal+</u> and <u>pepper</u>
	became what people used for <u>money</u> .
7.	One of the reasons why <u>spices</u> became so important
	to Europeans had to do with the Preservation of
	meat. During this time in history, there was no way to
	properly <u>Store</u> meat.
8.	Since <u>refridgeration</u> fechniques had not yet been invented
	nor was there any <u>electricity</u> , Europeans had to
	come up with other ways to <u>Cover</u> the <u>+aste</u>
_	and <u>Smell</u> of the <u>rotten</u> meat they ate.
9.	Europeans did this by heavily rubbing <u>spices</u> and
	all over the meat before it was cooked
	Other spices from India included Paprika, cinnamon
	and thyme.


- 10. Perfumes and <u>o; s</u> were also in high <u>demand</u> by Europeans as well. Regular <u>bathing</u> was not part of the <u>Culture</u> of the Europeans.
- 11. It was also not practical, since there was no indoor

  plumbing and water had to <u>Carried</u> from rivers and streams that were often <u>located</u> many miles away.
- 12. Europeans also did not have the ability to <u>launder</u> (wash) their clothing, often wearing the same heavy robes, etc. for many month or years.
- 13. To cover up <u>body odor</u>, wealthy Europeans relied upon special <u>perfumes</u> and <u>Oils</u>.
- 14. Dependence upon <u>trade</u> with India changed in 1453 when the <u>Ottoman Turks</u> began and The

Crusades and conquered the city of Constantinople making it impossible to travel (Istanbul) through there anymore. Constantinople was

the <u>gate</u> to the Silk Road and travel to <u>India</u> was not possible without going through this city.

- 15. This prompted European countries scramble to find a water route to India.
- 16. The first <u>Country</u> to do so could potentially the <u>world</u>.

#### Lesson 3: The Race for the Water Route to Asia

1. Europe had also made great advances in <u>Sailing</u> and
<b>Navigation</b> at this time.
2. They made faster <u>ShipS</u> by creating special
<b>Sails</b> that caught the <b>Wind</b> in a different way than
before. (Caravels)
3. They improved <b>Navigating</b> with the invention of the
Compass and astrolabe
4. Using these advances in <u>Sailing</u> , Europeans set out to
find a <u>water</u> route to India (Asia) to get around
Constantinople and the Ottoman Turks.
5. As a result, the <u>Course</u> of world <u>historichanged</u>
forever.
6. <b>Fortuge</b> led the way in finding a water route to Asia.
7. Portugal's King John asked his son Prince, Henry, to start a
new school for havigators.
8. Prince Henry is known to history as Prince Henry the
Navigator.  The selection was kept Sacret. There are
9. The school's navigation was kept <u>Secret</u> . Those not
following those rules were <u>jailed</u> , <u>tortured</u> and in some cases, even <u>killed</u> .
10. Prince Henry the Navigator taught his sailors to sail around
the tip of <u>Africa</u> and <u>east</u> to India, not <u>west</u> , as
was the way most thought was the correct route.
11. Bartholomeu Dias and Vasco
Da Gama were among the first to sail around the tip
of Africa and the Cape of Good Hope to Asia (India).
12. As a result, this route around the tip of Africa
started Europeans buying <b>Slaves</b> from Africa.
13. In the beginning, the slave <b>+rade</b> was started by other
Africans selling captives they had captured in wars on rival fribes.
14. At the time of Prince Henry's death, Portuguese traders were
buying <b>Housands</b> of slaves a year from <b>Atrican</b> traders.

18. Behaim's globe was <u>round</u> , but was <u>Wronq</u> ; it	
showed the Earth much <b>Smaller</b> than it actually is, and did	
not show the countries of North and South America	
Canada, or Austraila. It also showed Africa	
too <u>Small</u> in the wrong <u>Place</u> .
