



Lesson 2: Christopher Columbus's Voyage


4	Columbus's Background
1.	Christopher Columbus is probably the most <u>ukll-known</u> of all European <u>explorers</u> .
2.	He was from Genoa Thaly which was a huge center of
	<u>trade</u> in Europe at that time.
3.	Columbus grew up listening to the tales of <u>Sea Captains</u>
	and the travels of Marco Polo.
4.	Columbus is said to have read Marco Polo's
	many times. How and Why Columbus Sailed
5	After Portugal began to lead the way in
•	exploration; the country of Spain Portugal's rival,
	decided they wanted to beat the rest of Europe, especially
	Portugal, in finding the Shortest water route to India
	(Asia).
6.	Columbus was turned down by his native
	Ttaly when he petitioned the king for
	Financial backing to make his journey.
	Finally, after <u>Several</u> years of making his case to Spain, King <u>Ferdinand</u> , and Queen <u>Isabella</u>
	gave Columbus the <u>money</u> , <u>Ships</u> , and
	rew to set out.
8.	Since he knew the world was round , as most people did
	during this time, Columbus believed if he sailed <u>west</u>
	across the <u>Atlantic</u> , he would eventually reach
	India (Asia)
	He did not know North America and South America
	were in his way. Columbus Lands in "India"
	Afterweeks at sea, Columbus and his crew finally
	reached land.
11.	The land Columbus reached was in what is today called
	the <u>Bahamas</u> .
12.	The island was called <u>Cuan ahani</u> by the natives
•	who lived there called the <u>TainO</u> .

13. Columbus renamed the island <u>San Salvador</u> ; it
remains San Salvador to this day.
14. Since Columbus thought he was in <u>India</u> , he
called the natives he met there <u>"Indians"</u> . The
Bahamas are called the "West Indies" because
of Columbus's mistake.
15. Later, other <u>explorers</u> would prove Columbus
did not reach India, but had indeed discovered + wo
continents previously unknown to <u>Europeans</u> .
16. Until his death in 1506, Columbus refused
to accept he had not reached India.
Little Known Facts About Columbus*
17. When Columbus returned to after his first
journey there, he took around <u>500</u> native people
from the island of Guanahani, and what is today
Hati back to Spain as Save gifts to the King
and Queen.
18. Columbus made <u>3</u> more trips to the Bahamas, and to
explore the continent of South America, for a
total of trips in all.
19. Columbus never set foot on the continent of

North America although there
is an <u>American</u> holiday for him.
20. Columbus made some of his governors of
the <u>Colonies</u> he made in South America.
21. These sons <u>enslaved</u> many of the native people
there, forcing them to <u>Work</u> in <u>Gold</u> and
Silver mines.

<u>Lesson 3: England Begins to Explore and Settle</u>

- England began to want <u>Colonies</u> in the Americas. They
 did not want <u>Spain</u> or France to control all of North
 America.
- 2. England was <u>enemies</u> with France and most especially with <u>Spain</u>.
- 3. Also, English explorers hoped to find gold and other treasures
- 4. English explorers Sir Frances Drake and Sir Walter Raleigh

 pirated Spanish ships and Stole their cargo.
- 5. The pirating actions began to raise <u>tensions</u> between England and Spain to the point of <u>War</u>.
- 6. When England's monarch, Queen Elizabeth Took the throne, she encouraged exploration and Colonization
- 7. Queen Elizabeth I was the first <u>female</u> monarch in England. She was the oldest daughter of <u>King Henry</u> VIII (8th)
- 8. Queen Elizabeth I was treated <u>harshy</u> by many in her <u>country</u> because she was a woman. Many did not think she could <u>lead</u> well because she was a <u>temale</u>
- 9. As Queen Elizabeth saw it, the <u>key</u> to gaining <u>power</u> in Europe was through the <u>treasures</u> that were being found in the Americas.
- 10. She used much of the **gold** from pirated **Spanish** ships to **Spanish** in the
- ships to pay for her plans to Colonize in the New World.
- England's actions would eventually lead to <u>war</u> with <u>Spain</u>.




Lesson 4: The Mystery of Roanoke

Lesson 4. The Mystery of Routloke
1. Queen Elizabeth Lave Sir Walter Raleighermission
set up England's <u>first</u> colony in North America.
2. In July, 1587, English colonists landed on an island off
the coast of what is today North Carolina
3. This island was already occupied by the Hatterns Indians,
Wind called it Rognoke; the English renamed it Virginia
4. Raleigh's expedition was led by a man named
John White
5. The first English <u>Child</u> born in North America was born
in Roanoke; she was named <u>Virginia</u> Dare
6. The colonists were unprepared for life in the New World and
quickly began to run but of <u>Supplies</u> . 7. White left Roanoke in and returned to <u>England</u> for
supplies.
8. Because of a war with <u>Spain</u> , and the need for all
for the war effort, White's ship was
Comandeered, or taken over by the government.
 White was unable to return to Roanoke for 3 years.
10. When White finally returned, all the colonists had
11. All that was left were the letters <u>CRO</u> and <u>Croatoan</u>
carved into a <u>Palisad</u> , or wall, of the fort.
12. Historians have many theories as to what happened.
13. Some believe they were <u>abducted</u> and killed by
Indians in a battle for their homeland.

14. Others believe they went to live with the friendly <u>Croatoan</u> Indians.

15. John White searched for many years, but <u>Storms</u> kept him from traveling to the home of the <u>Croatoan</u>.




Lesson 5: England's Jamestown Colony
1. The tailure of the Roanoke Colony did not
2. After the English defeat of the Spanish armada, or
fleet of ships, Spain was <u>broken</u> .
3. The way was clear for England to take over
colonization of the <u>New World</u>
4. In May, 1607 a group of ships sailed into what is today
the Chesapeake Bay , off the coast of Virginia.
5. They named their colony <u>Jamestown</u> , in honor of
King James I of England.
6. Their biggest goal was to strike it <u>rich</u> in <u>gold</u>
mines; they did not <u>qrow</u> any tood, and planned on
living on the supplies they <u>brought</u> from England.
7. Their supplies soon <u>ran out</u> , and the gold they sought
after never <u>Materialized</u>
8. By the end of the first <u>year</u> , over <u>3/4</u> the colonists
had <u>died</u> . They called it the
Starving Time
9. Things turned around in the colony when John Smith
became its <u>leader</u> .
10. Captain Smith made one big rule: "If thou doest not work, thou doest not eat." 11. Soon colonists had made many new homes planted
"It thou doest not work, thou doest not con.
11. 30011, Colonisis flad fridde friding flew, planted
<u>Crops</u> , and built <u>Walls</u> to protect the settlement
that would later resemble a <u>triangle</u>
12. The cash crop of tobacco became the "gold" of
Jamestown Colony. 13. Over 50 Eastern Woodland Indian tribes lived in
the area. 14. Most were in an alliance with Chief Powhatan and did

not take kindly to the <u>Qrrival</u> of the English colonists.
15. At one point, Captain Smith was <u>abducted</u> by
Indians, and condemned to <u>death</u> . 16. He was <u>released</u> , however, presumably to keep the
<u>peace</u> in the region.

17. Other tribes of Indians showed the colonists how to plant https://doi.org/10.1001/j.com/html, which they exported to Europe, and made a huge profit.

18. Jamestown is the <u>first</u> PERMANENT English settlement in the Americas.

19. The English colony of Virginia began to <u>export</u>, or send out of the country, tobacco. They would also <u>import</u>, or bring into the country, <u>goods</u> from Great Britain.

20. Jamestown became very <u>Prosperous</u> and became a <u>destination</u> for many English men and women who wanted to begin a new <u>life</u> in the New World.



L	esson 6: England's Plymouth Colony and the Pilgrims
1.	In <u>1620</u> , another group of English colonists set out on a
	ship for North America; there were people on board.
2.	They were planning to work for the <u>king</u> , and settle
	near <u>James town</u> on Virginia Bay Company land.
3.	The colonists were going to Work for the Virginia Bay
	Company in exchange for them <u>paying</u> their passage
	on the ship they were to travel in, the May Flower
4.	Among the <u>Passengers</u> on the Mayflower was a group of
	religious <u>Pilaims</u> called <u>Puritans</u>
5 .	They left England , and later, Denmark because they
	believed <u>differently</u> than the King.
6.	At this time in England, everyone had to belong to
	whatever <u>Church</u> the king belonged to; those who do not
	worship as the King does can be jailed or even killed
7.	This is why many people left Great Britain.
8.	Most of the New England colonies were for
_	reasons.
9.	Instead of landing near Jamestown, they landed much
	further North, off the coast of what is today

16. An Indian named Tisquantum (Squant phelped the
colonists survive the winter; he spoke English
because he had been <u>enslaved</u> and taken to
many years before.
17. He escaped and returned to his home, the very
village the colonists were <u>living in</u> , to find all his people
dead .
18. Tisquantum (Squanto) had no hate in his heart for the
Europeans. He taught them how to <u>farm</u> , even though
the <u>rocky</u> soil made it hard to farm in New England. They
became successful farmers.
19. He also taught them to hunt, and helped them
survive in their new home.
20. He also served as a sort of <u>Ombassador</u> and translator to
the Wampanoag and the surrounding <u>Indian</u> tribes.
21. The Pilgrims made an <u>agreement</u> of <u>Peace</u> with the
Wampanoag and surrounding Indian tribes that lasted a
generation (25 years) However, the Children and grandchildren of the Pilgrims broke those agreements and killed many native
Pilgrims broke those agreements and killed many native
people.
The "Dish" on Thanksgiving*
24. Thanksgiving was made a national holiday in the year
18/3 by President Apraham. Lincolnical
1863 by President Abraham. Lincolity 25. The "first" Thanksgiving was a harvest festival and not a
religious family gathering. The Pilgrims were not
religiously tolerant, and considered the native Indians
savages. They would not have invited or
celebrated a religious event with them.
26. The Wampanoag Indians were invited to the gathering by
<u>accident</u> ; they showed up in the Pilgrim village after
hearing <u>shots</u> in the woods. They thought the Pilgrims
were coming to <u>war</u> with them, when in fact the
Pilgrims were hunting.
27. The Wampanoag's returned with several deer to
contribute to the feast.

28. The Indians did not sit <u>in chairs</u> at a table; the Indians ate several <u>feet</u> away from the Pilgrims and sat on the <u>ground</u>.


29. The first Thanksgiving feast most likely did not contain <u>Sweets</u>, <u>Stuffing</u>, and cranberry sauce. They probably had a lot of <u>Seafood</u>, and English dishes like <u>blood</u> pudding




Squanto may have looked like this when he was kidnapped as a teenager


