



1.	During the last <u>Ice Age</u> , scientists and
	historians believe Asian <u>nomads</u> crossed a
	land bridge that connected Asia to
	North America in the regions of Russia_ and
	Alaska.
2.	The nomads were following the large wooly <u>mammoth</u>
	in Dands of hunting parties. History calls these
	people Paleo-Indians. Paleo is Greek
	and means <u>ancient</u> .
3.	Paleo-Indians did not realize they were changing
	history by crossing the land bridge. It is now
	called Beringia , because it is located in what is
	now called the Bering Strai.
4.	The nomads migrated all the way down through
	Canada and North Hmerica and
	through Mexico and South America over time.
5 .	Beringia is no longer there. Scientists believe it has
	been covered by <u>Water</u> after the <u>Ice Age</u>
	ended and the sea levels rose when the
	glaciers melted. Any evidence it existed is
	gone.
6.	Some scientists and historians also believe in the
	theory of Pangeo, which states that
	all and masses in the world were once
	Connected, then <u>moved</u> away from each
	other.
7.	The land masses could be put back together like a
	Duzzle When they were <u>Connected</u> ,

Paleo-Indians Walked across from Asia to the Americas.

- 8. Later, changes in the <u>environment</u> had an impact on the <u>Culture</u> of those <u>Paleo Indians</u> who spread across the Americas.
- 9. Some <u>archaeologists</u> have found evidence that <u>Paleo Indians</u> may have moved to the Americas earlier than <u>14,000</u> years ago. Biblical scholars, however, believe this happened no more than <u>6,000</u> years ago.
- 10. The descendants of these ancient Americans created <u>Origin Stories</u> to explain their beliefs about the <u>Creation</u> of the world.
- 11. Their <u>religion</u> is an important part of these stories.





4.	The change to a <u>Warmer</u> , drier climate in North
	America, however, led to the <u>extinction</u> of
	the wooly <u>Mammoth</u> .
5.	When the Environment became warmer,
	Paleo - Indians adapted to the new
	environment by becoming food <u>gathers</u> and
	hunters of smaller <u>animals</u> .
6.	The most dramatic <u>change</u> in early Native
	American Indian <u>Culture</u> occurred when these
	early peoples began to <u>plant</u> seeds and
	grow some of their own <u>Crops</u> .
7.	This was the beginning of <u>Agriculture</u> , or farming
	in the Americas.
8.	
	Indians to <u>settle</u> in one place, so they no longer

9. It also allowed them to have a food <u>Surplus</u>, and begin job <u>Specialization</u>. 10. After specialization, Paleo-Indians had the **TIME** to create elements of <u>culture</u> like art, <u>music</u>, and religion. 11. Native American Indians created <u>theories</u> to explain their <u>beliefs</u> about the world and their place in it. 12. Religion is an important part of these stories. 13. Culture is the way of <u>life</u> of a group of People. 14. All cultures must meet these basic needs to exist: Food (includes water), clothing and <u>Shelter</u>. This is all they had time to do before <u>agriculture</u>. 15. These <u>basic</u> needs were expanded after the invention of <u>agriculture</u>. 16. Farming, or <u>agriculture</u>, changed the world.

	lived along the Mexican east coast from 2,500 B.C.E.
	to around 400 B.C.E.
2.	The Olmec civilization is known as the "mother
	civilization of the <u>Americas</u> " because of its
	influence on later Native American groups that
	came after them.
3.	The Olmecs carved huge stone heads to represent
	their <u>gods</u> .
4.	Theseheads had what appears to be
	helmets on and misshapen heads. They
	looked different from how the Olmecs themselves
	probably looked. Historians wonder where the
	people of these <u>heads</u> came from.
5.	The Olmecs practiced <u>body modification</u> . They

9.	The first <u>Pyramids</u> in the Americas were built by
	the Olmecs.

The Mound Builders 10. From about to about 3400 B.C.E to the 1500s C.E., the Mississipians, Hopewell, and Adena made up the Mound Builder civilization in North America. 11. The Mound Builders' __culture lasted for over 5000 years. 12. Although the three groups lived in many different areas, the people shared many beliefs artifacts, and <u>religion</u>. 13. One group, the Hopewell, was located in parts of what are now the Penny royal , sield Knobs , Bluegrass, and Eastern of Kentucky. 14. The most important thing the three groups all shared were the <u>ear thworks</u>they built. 15. The Mound Builders buried their dead in the mounds and often built <u>temples</u> on top of them that were often shaped like <u>pyramids</u> 16. These temples were places to worship 17. The dead were buried in the <u>mounds</u> and then covered over with layers of dirt Artifacts in the form of items from the person's life were buried in the mound with the body. 19. Archaeologists have uncovered many layers of skeleton's , shards of pottery, and tools.

20. The Mayans lived in Meso-America, today
known as Central America between 2000
B.C.E. and the mid 1500s C.E.
21. They were the <u>ancestors</u> of the Olmecs.
22. The Mayans were the most <u>advanced</u>
people in the Americas and were <u>astronome</u> and
architects of large <u>Pyramids</u> made from a
substance they invented, called <u>ch'uu</u> .
23. The Mayans invented the concept of the number
<u>zero</u> which did not occur in <u>Europe</u> until
hundreds of years later.
24. Their ability to use zero to count very high enabled
they to create a very accurate <u>Calendars</u> which
was <u>round</u> not <u>linear</u> .
25. The Mayans believed time was a <u>Circle</u> and
that certain parts of <u>time</u> would occur again.
26. Their calendar was not just the way they marked
the passage of <u>time</u> , it was also a big part of
their <u>religion</u> . They were <u>obsessed</u> with time.
27. The Mayans accurately predicted <u>unar</u> and
<u>Solar</u> eclipses thousands of years into the future. Sometimes these predictions have been <u>interpreted</u>
sometimes these predictions have beenfor the future
as messages of <u>doom</u> for the future. 28. Another part of the Mayan's <u>Culture</u> was

29. They believed the <u>Sun</u> fed on <u>blood</u> and

The Aztecs 31. Farther ______ from Meso-America lived a group of Native Americans called the Aztecs between 1200 C.E. and the 1520s C.E. 32. The Aztecs conquered all the <u>cultures</u> in central America and made them pay heavy tribute or taxes. 33. This enabled the Aztecs to build the greatest city in the Americas called Tenochtitlan in what is today Mexico City, one of the largest cities in the world. 34. Tenochtitlan was in the middle of a <u>Swamp</u> called Lake <u>lexcoco</u>. **35.** The Aztecs were brilliant <u>**enginees**</u>, much like the Mayans. 36. Much of their history was destroyed by Spanish explorers who came to <u>colonize</u> the land. 37. The Aztecs had a <u>calendar</u> similar to the Mayans called a **Sunstone** 38. Like the Mayans, the Aztecs practiced human sacrifice **39.** They, too, used the **blood** in religious ceremonies. 40. Because the Spanish explorers were **Christians**, they believed the Aztecs were __evil__ because of the human <u>Sacrifice</u>. 41. This was one of the main reasons the Spanish used to <u>justifu</u> the destruction of the Aztec

<u>The Anasazi</u>
42. The Anasazi civilization existed from about
1000 B.C.E. to 1300 C.E. in the <u>southwestern</u>
United States.
43. As with the Olmecs and Mound Builders, <u>religion</u>
was central to the <u>Ana Sazi</u> civilization.
44. The Anasazi grew <u>corn</u> and worshipped it as
well.
45. They built huge <u>Pueblos</u> in groups much
like our <u>apart ment</u> stoday.
46. Later, for reasons archaeologists cannot <u>explain</u> ,
they began building their pueblos high in cliffs;
Many of them are still there today, like the Mesa Verde
pueblo in <u>Colorado</u>
47. The Anasazi <u>disappeared</u> ; scientists do not
know why. They theorize an extended <u>drought</u>
drove them from their land.
48. This could also be why the Anasazi
their <u>pueblos</u> to cliffs. It could have been a way to <u>protect</u> food <u>Surpluses</u> .

49. Some archaeologists believe there is <u>evidence</u>
to suggest some Anasazi even practiced
Canabilism, or the eating of human flesh
50. The Anasazi were named by the Navajo , a later
group of people thought to be their descendants.
Anazai means "Ancient Ones " in the
Navajo language.

<u>The Incas</u>
51. The Incas lived high in the Andes Mountains
in South America from 1200 C.E. to around the
mid 1500s.
52. They are known mostly for their strong central
governmen, their <u>feligion</u> , and their <u>cit</u> ies
53. The Incas worshipped the <u>Sun</u> , like many
ancient people.
54. They believed to came from the sun,
and made many <u>religious</u> objects from it.
and made many <u>religious</u> objects from it. 55. These objects were <u>holy</u> , not used as
money or to represent <u>greed</u> . 56. The Incas were able to build huge <u>cities</u> on the very tops of mountain like <u>Cousco</u> and
56. The incas were able to build hugecitieS on
the very tops of mountain like Cousco and
57. The Incas also practiced human Sacrifice, but in
a different way trom the Mayans and Aztecs.
58. Instead of cutting the hearts from the bodies
of the sacrifices and behead them, the Inca cas
them off the highest of the <u>mountains</u> .
59. Many Inca <u>mummies</u> have been found
preserved in ice as there is a huge gacier
in the mountains of South America.
60. Some of these <u>mummies</u> look as if they are
only <u>Sleeping</u> and have not been <u>dead</u> for
hundreds of years
61. The Inca culture was <u>destroyed</u> by Spanish
explorers.
