



The Industrial Revolution
· The <u>Industrial Revolution</u> changed the way
goods were made.
<ul> <li>Before the Industrial Revolution, goods were</li> </ul>
made by hand. After the Industrial Revolution,
goods were made by <u>Machines</u> .
• Machines helped businesses <u>manufacture</u> goods
cheaper and <u>faster</u> .
<ul> <li>The Industrial Revolution began in <u>Great Britain</u>.</li> </ul>
At first Britain wanted to keep its <u>technology</u> a
<u>Secret</u> . Britain did not want <u>Others</u> to
know about the <u>new; deas</u> to make <u>tools</u> .
The Industrial Revolution came to the United States
in the late 1700s. An <u>immigrant</u> from Great
Britain named <u>Samuel Slater</u> brought the
plans for the first Spinning machineto the
United States.
The spinning machine Wove cotton fibers into
cloth called textiles
The first <u>Cotton spinning</u> machine was built in
New England in 1790. New England
<u>factories</u> used <u>rivers</u> to <u>power</u>
their machines.
Many people from nearby <u>farms</u> moved to towns
and <u>Cities</u> to <u>Work</u> at these factories.



<ul> <li>Also, many <u>Children</u> worked in these factories.</li> </ul>
They did not have a <u>quality of life</u> or
education.
<ul> <li>Later, <u>labor unions</u> would fight to</li> </ul>
improve the quality of life for people working in
<u>factories</u> in the Industrial Revolution.
• The role of <u>Women</u> in the culture of America
began to <u>Change</u> : Women began to work <u>autside</u>
the home for the first time.
Women's Rights
<ul> <li>Women had <u>few rights</u> in the early 1800s. They</li> </ul>
were not allowed to <u>vote</u> . Married women could
not <u>Own</u> property. They could not go to most
<u>Colleges</u> Susan B. Anthony, <u>Elizabeth Cady</u> and Lucretia Mott worked for women's <u>rights</u> .
· Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady and
Lucretia Mott worked for women's rights. Convention
In 1848 they put together the <u>Senera Falls</u> .
At this meeting, people talked about the <u>rights</u>
women should have.
Inventions Change Factories and Farms
. Machines that helped businesses make more
goods were <u>invented</u> . This meant more
<u>products</u> for Americans and for <u>trade</u> .
· For example, Eli Whitney invented the
<u>cotton gin</u> . This machine could clean
50 times as much cotton a day as workers
could by <u>hand</u> .
<ul> <li>More <u>cotton</u> could be harvested. This meant</li> </ul>
that more <u>cloth</u> could be made.


The <u>Mechanical leaper</u> was invented in 1831 by
The <u>Mechanical Rapel</u> was invented in 1831 by <u>Cyrus McCormick</u> . It helped workers
harvest wheat more easily. John Deere
came up with a steel <u><b>plow</b></u> . It made plowing
fields much <u>easier</u> .
Moving Goods and People-The Steamboat
<ul> <li>People needed <u>better</u> ways to get their products</li> </ul>
to <u>market</u> . Settlers going <u>West</u> also needed
better methods of <u>transportation</u> . The
Mississippi River was the
<u>Main artery</u> of transportation.
The Mississippi River makes up the
<u>far Western border</u> of Kentucky. The Ohio
River was also used for trade and transportation. The
Ohio River makes up the <u>northern border</u> of
Kentucky. The Kentucky River flows <u>Hhrough</u> the
Bluegrass Region of Kentucky.
In 1807 Robert Fulton invented a <u>riverboat</u> powered
by a <u>Steam</u> engine. It, too, was used for
<u>trade</u> and transportation. It made traveling
<u>against</u> a river's <u>Current</u> much easier.
he Erie Canal
<u>Canals</u> were built in areas where there were
no <u>rivers</u> .
The <u>Erie Canal</u> linked the <u>Great Lakes</u>
and the Atlantic Ocean. People and goods could
travel on the canal to and from the <u>East</u>
and the western frontier.

Early Railroads
 On the <u>earliest</u> railroads, <u>horses</u> pulled carts over the <u>rails</u>. The rails were made of <u>Wood</u> and covered with <u>iron</u>.
 In 1830 a <u>Steam engine</u>, or locomotive, was built to <u>Pull</u> carts over rails. It could pull <u>heavier</u> loads <u>faster</u> than horses could. Railroads became the <u>Cheapest</u> and easiest way to <u>travel</u>.
 The Telegraph
 <u>Samuel Morse</u> invented the <u>telegraph</u> and Morse Code in 1844. It was used to send <u>messages</u> over great distances.
 The telegraph was the first method of <u>transcontinental communication</u>.
 This <u>new invention</u> could send messages along wifes using electricity. The telegraph sent

wires using electricity. The telegraph sent messages <u>across</u> the country in minutes.

In October 1861 the <u>first</u> telegraph line across the <u>United States</u> finished.


 Later, the telegraph would <u>Contribute</u> to the Union Army <u>Winning</u> the Civil War.



## Social Studies Notes Moving Westward

#### **Indian Removal**

In the 1820s and 1830s, many Americans <u>moved</u>
onto Native American land in the Southeast.
President Andrew Jackson wanted settlers to
move to this land.
In 1830 Congress passed the Indian Remova
In 1830 <u>Congress</u> passed the <u>Indian Remova</u> Act. The act gave the President power to <u>Move</u>
Native Americans to <u>Indian Territory</u> . Indian
Territory was in present-day Oklahoma
The <u>Cherokee</u> were one of these Native
American groups. They tried to keep their land
American groups. They tried to <u>keep</u> their land by going to <u>Court</u> . They won.
The Supreme Court said that the Cherokee had the
<u>right</u> to keep their <u>land</u> .
President Jackson did not <u>Support</u> the Court's
decision and made the native peoplemove_
anyway.
he Trail of Tears
In 1838 the <u>Cherokee</u> were forced to <u>leave</u>
their land. The <u>route</u> they took to Indian
Territory was known as the <u>Trail of Tears</u>
The 800-mile journey was terribly hard.
Thousands of Cherokee died along the way.
ne California Gold Rush
stream bed This discovery started -
In 1848 James Marshall discovered <u>gold</u> in a stream <u>bed</u> . This discovery started a time in history known as the <u>Gold Rush</u> .

Spanish <u>mission</u> called the <u>Alamo</u>


· Although the brave <u>defenders</u> of the Alamo were defeated, Sam Houston led Texans to defeat the Mexicans. They forced Mexican President Santa Anna to move his troops south of the Rio Grande which is now our modern-day border with Mexico.

Some Americans believed in <u>manifest desting</u>. Texas

became a <u>State</u> in 1845.

The Mexican War broke out between the United States and Mexico in 1846 soon after the defeat of the settlers at the Alamo

The United States Won the war. The states of Texas, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, and Wyoming were added to the United States as a <u>result</u> of the Mexican War.



## Social Studies Notes The Civil War

Two Regions
The Southern and Northern parts of the
United States became very <u>different</u> from each
other.
· In the <u>South</u> most people lived and <u>worked</u> on
farms. Southern <u>towns</u> were usually small. In the
North many people moved to big <u>cities</u> to work
in <u>factories</u> after the Industrial Revolution.
Slavery in the South
By 1850 slavery was <u>illegal</u> in most <u>Northern</u>
states. But slavery was <u>allowed</u> in the <u>South</u> .
Slavery was very important to the <u>economy</u>
of the South.
Cotton was a main <u>Crop</u> in the South. Most
slaves worked in the cotton <u>fields</u> . Slaves
worked on <u>Plantations</u> and on small farms.
As the <u>demand</u> for cotton grew, so did the
<u>Number</u> of slaves in the South. In 1860 there
were almost <u>four</u> million enslaved African
Americans in the United States. The number of
<u>free</u> African Americans was much <u>lower</u> .
Most <u>free</u> African Americans lived in the <u>North</u>
They did not have the <u>Same</u> rights as whites.
ifferent Views on Slavery
Many people were <u>against</u> slavery. Those who fought against slavery were called <u>abolitionists</u>
fought against slavery were called <u>abolitionists</u>
The wanted to abolish, or <u>end forever</u> , the


practice of slavery. They felt that <u>one</u> person
should <u>not</u> be allowed to <u>own</u> another.
· Slave <u>owners</u> in the South felt differently. They
argued that <u>factory workes</u> in the North were
treated <u>Worse</u> than slaves were.
African Americans Resist Slavery
* <u>Enslaved</u> people were treated <u>badly</u> They
were beaten. Their families were broken apart.
- Slave codes made life hard for slaves.
They could not own <u>property</u> . They could not <u>eave</u> plantations without <u>permission</u>
<u>leave</u> plantations without <u>permission</u>
Many slaves resisted, or <u>acted against</u> slave
owners. Some slaves <u>resisted</u> by not obeying
their <u>Masters</u> . Other slaves <u>ran awau</u> .
Some refused to work They also worked
Slowly or pretended to be <u>sick</u> .
Still others broke work tools. Many slaves were
not allowed to learn to read or Write.
Some resisted by learning in <u>Secret</u> - Frederick
Underground Railroad Douglass
The <u>Underground Kailroad</u> helped thousands of
slaves escape It was a <u>Secret system</u> that
helped slaves <u>escape</u> from the South to the <u>North</u> .
Certain people <u>helped</u> slaves escape. They were
called "Conductors". Conductors hid enslaved
people on the journey <u>north</u> . They led enslaved
people from one hiding place to another.
Harriet Tubman was the most famous
conductor. Tubman had <u>escaped</u> from slavery

in about 1849. She helped <u>Free</u> more than
Lincoln Is Elected President
- Abraham Lincolnyas elected President in 1860.
Southerners were afraid that Lincoln would
end slavery and that their opinions would not
matter to the new government
Southern States Secede
By February 1861 <u>Seven</u> Southern states
decided to break away, or <u>Secede</u> , from the
United States.
• States that remained <u>loyal</u> to the United States
government were called the <u>Union</u> .
<ul> <li>South Carolina, Alabama, Florida, Mississipp</li> </ul>
Georgia, Louisiana, and Texas seceded. These
states formed their own government called the
Confederacy.
The Confederacy created its own constitution, <u>flag</u> , and <u>Money</u> . It supported <u>States' rights</u> and
and <u>Money</u> . It supported <u>States' rights</u> and
slavery.
The Confederacy elected <u>Vetterson Pavis</u> as its
president. Davis was a former U.S. <u>Senator</u> from
Mississippi.
When Lincoln became <u>President</u> on March 4,
1861, the Confederacy had taken <u>Control</u> of
1861, the Confederacy had taken <u>Control</u> of most of the <u>Military property</u> the South. One of the <u>forts</u> still under Union control was <u>Fort Sumter</u> in Charleston, South
the <u>forts</u> still under Union control was
Carolina.

The War Begins
In April, 1861. the Confederacy demanded that
the Union <u>Surrender</u> Fort Sumter. When the fort's
<u>Commander</u> , Major Robert Anderson, did not
immediately <u>Surrender</u> , Jefferson Davis ordered
Confederate soldiers to <u>attack</u> the fort,
starting the <u>Civil War</u> .
* A <u>Civil war</u> is a war between people of the same
<u>country</u> .
· Lincoln responded to the <u>attack</u> by sending
75,000 Union soldiers to <u>Put down</u> the
75,000 Union soldiers to <u>Put down</u> the Confederate <u>rebellion</u> . Lincoln thought it would
take about 90 days. It took 4 years.  General Wysses 5. Grant was chosen to
General <u>Mysses S. Grant</u> was chosen to
lead the Union Army. General Robert E. Lee
was chosen to lead the Confederate Army.
Lincoln's call for <u>troops</u> angered people in
Virginia, Arkansas, Tennessee, and North Carolina
These four states then joined the Confederacy.
There were nowstates in the Confederacy
and <u>a3</u> in the Union.
Four of the Union states—Delaware, Maryland Missouri, and Kentucky—were Slave states.
Missouri, and Kentucky-were <u>Slave</u> states.
They Weren't Sure if they wanted to Stay in the
Union or <u>join</u> the Confederacy. These were called
the border States because they were located between
the Union and the Confederacy.

- Some Southerners referred to the conflict as
the War for Southern Independence The war was also called the War Between the States.
was also called the War Between the States.
- The Civil War lasted longer and was bloodier
than anyone had expected.
The Emancipation Proclamation
On January 1, 1863, President Lincoln issued the
Emancipation Proclamation. This statement
called for <u>freedom</u> for slaves.
<ul> <li>Lincoln believed that he could <u>Save</u> the Union</li> </ul>
by ending <u>Slavery</u> .
The Rattle of Gettysburg
In 1863 the Battle of Gettusburg was
In 1863 the Battle of Gettysburg was fought in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.
On the first day, Union soldiers were forced
back. On the <u>second</u> day, Union soldiers held
their ground on hills. On the third day, both sides
exchanged cannon fire.
"Pickett's Charge" followed, a Mass attack
by Confederates across <u>open ground</u> toward well-
by Confederates across <u>open ground</u> toward well- protected <u>Union</u> troops.
The attack was a <u>disaster</u> for the Southern
troops and they <u>retreated</u> back into Virginia.
The Gettysburg Address
President Lincoln gave a <u>Speech</u> called the
<u>Gettysburg Address</u> . He gave it to <u>honor</u> the soldiers who had <u>died</u> in the battle
honor the soldiers who had died in the battle
and the war so far. Most of the land the

Battle of Gettysburg was <u>fought</u> upon was turned
into a <u>Cemetery</u> .
Lincoln wanted to <u>inspire</u> Americans to keep
their country <u>together</u> . He said that a
<u>United</u> country and an end to slavery were
worth fighting for.
The Battle of Gettysburg helpedturn the tide of
the war in <u>favor</u> of the <u>Union</u> .
The War Ends Union General William Tecumseh helped wear
down the Confederate army. He used total war to
destroy the Confederate soldiers' will to fight.
First, Sherman and his troops took Atlanta, Georgia
an important industrial and <u>railway</u> center.
Sherman's army marched to take over <u>Savannah</u>
Georgia. They <u>destroyed</u> everything in their
path that the South could <u>use</u> to keep
fighting. This is called Sherman's "March to
the Sea ."
The Confederacy <u>Surrendered</u> in Virginia on April 9.
1865. General Lee and General Grant met
in a farmhouse in Appomattox
Virginia, to discuss the <u>terms</u> of surrender.
The Civil War was the most <u>destructive</u> war in
American history. President Lincoln wanted
the country to join together and rebuild
itself. He would <u>Never</u> get the chance to help
it try.
On April 15, 1865, President Lincoln was <u>Assasinatel</u>

· Central Pacific workers had a difficult time building <u>tracks</u> over the <u>Sierra Nevada</u> mountain range. · Chinese Workers did much of the dangerous work. They blasted <u>funnels</u> through the mountains. · Native Americans did not want Union Pacific workers building tracks on their hunting grounds. Their pleas were <u>ignored</u>.

Buffalo, the center of the <u>Great Plains Indian</u> culture nearly went <u>extinct</u>. Many Native Americans Starved. Most had no choice but to move to reservations (previously called Ind The Golden Spike On May 10, 1869, the <u>tracks</u> of the two railroads <u>Met</u> at Promontory Point, <u>Utah</u>. A golden Spike was hammered into the track to show the \_\_\_\_ Success\_ of the project. People could now <u>travel</u> from coast to <u>Coast</u> in less than \_10 days. Several other railroad lines

### A New America

New Immigrants
Between 1880 and 1920, millions of immigrants
came to the United States. Immigrants came to find
iobs and <u>treedom</u> .
were escaping religious and political <u>Persecution</u> .
<ul> <li>Most <u>European</u> immigrants entered the United</li> </ul>
States at <u>Ellis Island</u> in New York Harbor. Most
Asian immigrants entered at Angel Island
in San Francisco Bay.
Life in the Cities
Most immigrants moved to large <u>cities</u> to
work in factories. There was a shortage of <u>housina</u> .
New immigrants crowded into <u>tenements</u> .
Living was difficult because the <u>apartments</u> in the
buildings were very <u>Small</u> and many had no heat.
Immigrants often faced <u>prejudice</u> when looking for
Work.
Vorkers and Unions
Many people worked in factories and <u>mines</u> . Many
workers put in <u>12-hourdays</u> days, <u>7</u> days a week.  Many <u>earned</u> just enough money to <u>Survive</u> .
Many <u>earned</u> just enough money to <u>Survive</u> .
Sweatshops like the Triangle Shirtwaist
Company in New York paid Women even less.
Sweatshops were hot, cramped <u>Workshops</u> .
In 1911, a fire started at the Triangle
Shirtwaist Company. Because of <u>unsafe</u> conditions

in the factory, 146 workers were <u>killed</u> in the fire.

Workers formed <u>labor unions</u> to fight better <u>money</u> and <u>safer</u> conditions.

Labor unions also fought for an 8-hour work day, a safer Workplace, and an end to child labor

Unions helped workers <u>Strike</u> to get what they wanted. Some <u>Strikes</u> ended in fights and <u>deaths</u>

Many labor unions
 were <u>Successful</u>.
 Working hours were
 <u>Shortened</u>. Workplaces
 were made <u>Safer</u>.

Timmigrants continued to come to the United States in search of Work and a better Life.

A new holiday was created to honor American workers and the work they do. It was called Labor Day. Congress made it a national holiday in 1894.
