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Lesson 1: The French and Indian War

•	After the 1667 settlement of Jamestown in
	Virginia Colony and the 1620 settlement of
	Plymouth in <u>Massachusetts</u> Colony, the Thirteen
	British colonies began to grow andProsper. They made a

•	West of the Appalachian Mountains lay a fertile
	valley around what is now the states of Ohio, Indiana,
	Kentucky, and Illinois called the Ohio River. Valley
•	The British claimed the Ohio River Valley because
	it was so close to <u>territory</u> they had already
	<u>Colonizeand</u> settled. However, the <u>trench</u> claimed
	the Ohio River Valley, too. They said since they controlled the
N	ississippi River, and that river flows through the
(<u>Thio River Va</u> , they should have a <u>Claim</u> to the land.
	There were also many Native Americans who already lived
	in the Ohio River Valley.
•	The French had been part of the <u>fur trading</u> business
	with the Native American tribes that lives in and
	around what is today <u>Canada</u> . Then, the French
	called Canada New France and they had many
	settlements and colonies there like Quebec. The
	French wanted to expand their fur trade into the
	Ohio Kiver Valley.
	The <u>dispute</u> over this land led to the <u>French+Indian</u> War
	This war began in 1754. In this war, the British fought against the French and Findians friendly
	fought against the <u>French</u> and <u>Indians</u> friendly
	with the French.



	 A Native American group called the <u>Iroquois</u>
	agreed to help the British <u>fight</u> the French. They
	taught the British how to Wage War in a way that was
	more <u>effective</u> in a <u>wooded</u> land. Many British
	<u>Colonists</u> in the Thirteen Colonies also
	fought in this war. These colonists helped the
	British win the war. The war ended in 1763
	The Ohio River Valley now belonged to Great Britain



	Act placed a tax on anything <u>Paper</u> in the colonies.
	This <u>tax</u> made the colonists very <u>anary</u> because
	they had not <u>Voted</u> for Parliament.
•	Those who lived in Great Britain itself did not have to
	pay this <u>extra</u> tax. Therefore, the <u>Colonists</u> felt
	Parliament had <u>no right</u> to tax them. The colonists felt
	that they <u>Should not</u> be taxed by a <u>Parliament</u> that
	did not <u>represent</u> , or speak for, them. They called this "No taxation Without Representation."

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
Lesson 3: The Revolution Begins

•	The British passed laws to Punish the people of Boston
	for the Boston Tea Party. British soldiers
	returned to Boston. The colonists had to house and
	feed the soldiers. A British <u>general</u> was put in
	control of all of Boston.
•	Also, the British closed Boston Harker until the people
	<u>paid</u> for the ruined <u>ta</u> . Colonists called
	these laws the <u>Intolerable</u> Acts
•	Colonists had to choose <u>Sides</u> . They became <u>Patriots</u>
	or Loyalists. Patriots were <u>against</u> British rule.
	Loyalists Supported British rule.
•	Events had reached a point and the colonists
	decided they needed to <u>decide</u> what to do next. They
	created <u>Committees of Correspondence</u> to share mess
	information and called for the First Continental to
	meet in Philadelphia, <u>Pennsylvania</u> in 1774.
•	Leaders from most colonies decided to stop <u>trade</u> with
3	Britain until the Intolerable Acts were repealed.
•	They also decided that all colonies should train milities
	Some militias called themselves <u>minutemen</u> . They could
	be <u>ready</u> to <u>fight</u> at a minute's notice.
_	Patrick Henry made a famous speech in

The Congress formed the Continental Armyith soldiers from all 13 colonies George Washington was <u>elected</u> to <u>lead</u> Continental Army as Commander-in-Cheit . The members of Congress wanted to try one last tim to make <u>peace</u> with Great Britain. After all that had happened, most colonists still did not want to break away. · So, the Congress sent King George III a letter called the Olive Branch Petition. The letter said that the colonists were still loya to Great Britain. They did not want to fight a war. The Congress asked the king to give the colonists more <u>Self-government</u> If the king did this, the colonists <u>Promised</u> there would be no more trouble. The king <u>refused</u> and said that he would use force to end the <u>sebellion</u> ____ said "The Revolution over. All that remains now is the War · On June 16, 1775, Patriot soldiers went to Charlestown, Massachusetts to get control of Bunker Hill and Breed's Hill. They planned to fire <u>Cannons</u> into Boston from nearby hilltops to force the British to leave. · Overnight, the <u>Vatriots</u> built a <u>fort</u> on Breed's Hill. The next day, more than 2,000 British soldiers attacked the fort. The Patriots drove the British back two times, but the **british** took the fort on the third attack. The British won the battle that became known as




• The Declaration of Independence was **approved** by the Second Continental Congress on **July 4,1716**. In August, members of the Congress **Signed** the Declaration. They knew it would be **death** to sign it. The British government would think they were **Traiters** or people who work **Agains 1** their country.

By this time, Frederich von Steub had taken care of the training of the Continental Army. The Patriots would have to <u>fight</u> against overwhelming danger bads to make their declaration a <u>reality</u>.

• The Declaration of Independence brought hope to the Patriots that they may actually <u>succeed</u> in breaking away from Great Britain. George Washington <u>read</u> the Declaration aloud to his soldiers before the Battle of <u>New York</u>.
